For your Convenience... Medicine Take-Back Option

When your medicines are no longer needed, they should be disposed of promptly and properly. Unused or expired prescription medications are a public safety issue, leading to potential accidental poisoning, misuse, and overdose.

Consumers and caregivers should remove expired, unwanted, or unused medicines from their home as quickly as possible to help reduce the chance that others accidentally take or intentionally misuse the medications and to help reduce drugs from entering the environment.

Flushing medications down the toilet or the sink is not necessarily a great idea. In recent studies, antidepressants have been found in the Great Lakes and in fish. Your toilet is not connected to a fifth dimensional zone or the Outer Limits. It is connected to our water system and our environment. Avoid these options. Don't add to the pollution around us. Proper disposal of unused drugs saves lives and protects the environment.

Medicine take-back options are the preferred way to safely dispose of most types of unneeded medicines. If you have any medications you no longer take and are looking for a safe, proper and convenient way to dispose of them, you may bring them to the Prospect Senior Center. We will in turn take them to our Resident State Troopers Office, right next door to the Senior Center, for proper disposal.

By the end of the 20th. century, rising labor and manufacturing costs prompted A. Wimpfhiemer & Bro. to move its operations to Virginia.

Over the last decade, The Velvet Mill has made an amazing transformation from a tired, old, abandoned mill to an artisan and small business marketplace. On Saturday mornings, it is home to the Stonington Village Farmers Market.

After our morning at the Velvet Mill, we'll board the bus, destined for the nearby Saltwater Farm Vineyard. Just as the Velvet Mill brought new life to an abandoned mill building, Saltwater Farm Vineyard invigorated a WWII era airplane hangar.

In 2001, Michael M. Connery bought this long dormant property and the story of Saltwater Farm Vineyard began. Saltwater Farm Vineyard is now an award winning vineyard, set on more than 100 panoramic acres overlooking Long Island Sound on which are planted six varieties of grapes. The Tasting Room is located in the impeccably restored WWII airplane hangar.

Last but not least, the Hunters' Brunch at the Griswold Inn in Essex, which was originally scheduled for February 13th. has been rescheduled for Sunday, May 15th. The bus will be departing from the Senior Center at 9:30 AM. 

Mongers Market is a team of Mongers whose wares include vintage, industrial, architectural, salvaged and reclaimed objects. Including furniture, clothing, doors, windows, lumber, galvanized objects, lighting, etc. John Hiden is the owner of the Market in Bridgeport, Ct. The Market is a 75,000-square-foot wonderland of salvaged and reclaimed objects set in a former Bridgeport factory.

Hiden, who discovered a passion for "all things old" at the age of 12 while digging for weathered bottles on the shores of Long Island Sound, hasn't always sold objects with more rust than gleam. In fact, for 21 years, he operated Hiden Galleries in Stamford, a celebrated multi-dealer shop that specialized in fine antiques.

He purchased the former Pratt, Read and Co. factory in Bridgeport in 2012 with the intention of relocating, and began to collect pieces of industrial salvage as "props" for a similar business he envisioned for the cavernous factory space in serious need of an overhaul. As renovations moved forward, however, the market began to shift.

"Sensibilities changed; tastes changed," says Hiden, who closed his Stamford showplace in May 2017. Millennials seem to have no interest in what he calls "brown" furniture (Empire or Victorian behemoths like those grandma made sure to dust once a week) — or even in antiquing itself.

"The real joy in this business is in the finding," says Hiden — and he is always looking. The fact that some of his favorite hunting grounds are former mills and factories is reflected in the staggering amount of industrial salvage waiting at the market to explore: factory machine legs in all heights, weights and colors, sawhorses, scaffolding hooks, coal scuttles, shop stools, wooden conveyor belts and who knows how many miles of reclaimed lumber. The list goes on and on, but, amazingly enough, if you ask Hiden the story behind each, he is likely to know.

"I pretty much know where everything here came from," he says. Over there, employee lockers from Ansonia Copper & Brass and copper vats from a perfume factory in West Haven; around the bend, ventilators from a tobacco barn in Windsor, wooden lanes from the late Sky Top Lanes bowling alley in Torrington and molds once used to cast steel and iron parts at U.S. Baird in Stratford (where Two Roads Brewing Co. now stands); in a far corner, dozens upon dozens of steamer trunks stacked floor to ceiling (oh, the stories they have to tell); on a mezzanine, rows upon rows of vintage doors waiting for a new purpose in life (perhaps as a headboard or as the top of funky new dining table). So much to see!

Bald Eagle Viewing @ Shepaug Eagle Observation Area Shepaug Dam - 2150 River Road, Southbury, Ct. Wednesday, March 9, 2022 11:00am. Departing @ 10:00am No Charge

Possibly the largest concentration of wintering eagles in Connecticut can be seen perching, fishing or flying at the Shepaug Dam on the Housatonic River in Southbury, Ct. Other birds also seen in this area include red-tail hawks, sharp-shinned hawks, goshawks, great blue herons and a variety of waterfowl.

The bald eagle is making a comeback thanks to intensive conservation efforts. Pesticide poisoning and direct human interference has, in the past, decimated bald eagle populations. The banning of DDT and stronger legal protections, combined with reintroduction and management efforts, have allowed eagle populations to rebound.

In the recent past, eagles were rarely seen during the summer months in Connecticut because nesting did not occur in the state. In 1992 a pair of eagles made Connecticut their home for what was believed to be the first time in 41 years. They began a new generation of eagles, and within a decade there were eight nesting pairs.

The Shepaug Dam holds a special appeal to the wintering birds because the hydroelectric station's operation prevents water from freezing, making it easy to feed on fish below the dam. Since it opened in 1985, the Shepaug Eagle Observation Area has hosted nearly 140,000 visitors to observe the eagles and view their exhibits.

We will be visiting the dam on Wednesday, March 9, 2022. Our guided viewing will be at 11:00am. The viewing will run for about one hour. High powered telescopes will be set up for us in strategic locations so that we have excellent viewing spots.

In the past, visitors have witnessed 10 or more eagles in a single day, not to mention a variety of other birds. Dress warmly and bring binoculars, if you have them, given the limited number of onsite telescopes that are available.

The town of Bantam has a thriving art community, great restaurants, a cinema, and the lake. The best-kept secret, however, is Bantam Tileworks, a wonderful studio and shop where colorful bowls, platters, plates and tiles are handcrafted and finished with a deep, rich glaze. Since they set up shop next to Arethusa Dairy and Creamery in 2012, Travis Messinger and Darin Ronning, owners of Bantam Tileworks, have been creating stunning ceramics, often working directly with customers to help them achieve their aesthetic vision.

It was in New York that the idea of Bantam Tileworks first came to Darin. While visiting the Metropolitan Museum of Art a friend pointed out a fountain made by Louis Comfort Tiffany and suggested that he put his nose up close to the glass. Darin quickly realized how many layers of color were visible in each piece of glass. It was something that he knew that he wanted to try to replicate in ceramic tiled surfaces.

After moving to Connecticut in 2004 Darin and Travis got the chance to attempt just that. For over a year they worked with up to 8,000 colors, combining them to create multi-layered depth to the glaze. Through a lot of trial and error they narrowed the options down to the 100-most eye-catching combinations for the current, though ever evolving, Bantam Tileworks palette.

Their tiles and tabletop pieces are unique specifically because of these multi-layered colors and the depth of the glazes. The tiles start as wet clay that is wedged, rolled, dried, cut, dried again, fired, glazed and fired again on the premises. There are over 100-colors in the palette to choose from.

Field tiles are used for bathrooms, backsplashes, fire places and flooring. Special animal tiles are designed and hand-carved by local artist Karen Hiebert. There are shaped tiles which are sometimes used in an entire room or for an accent band.

Whether used for large installations like entire bathrooms and sun-room floors or smaller ones like fireplace surrounds and backsplashes, the layered colors are what makes the tiles stand out in any room.

People love going to the studio to browse among the beautiful tiles and tableware in so many beautiful shapes and colors. Most don't leave empty-handed. If you see a platter you like but would prefer it in a different color, Darin and Travis can turn out a new piece in a matter of a few days. With reasonable prices, stylish pieces, and great customer service, Bantam Tileworks keeps their clientele happy and coming back for more.

Their clients really run the whole spectrum. Lots of times they work directly with the homeowners, but they also work with architects and designers from across the country. Lots of their tiles are installed in Connecticut and the New York area, but recently they have also been doing a lot of work in Florida, California, and Chicago.

The tableware they create is sold almost exclusively out of their shop to both full time residents and weekenders. People love to bring their guests and family members who are visiting to show them the studio and showroom and see just how everything is made.

Demonstration on...Exploring Various Pesto Sauces & What to Pair With Them Presented by Maryann Sasso Tuesday, March 29, 2022 \$5 10:30am.

Pesto is typically a bright, green sauce. It is, no doubt, one of the world's most loved sauces. The sauce originated in Genoa in the Liguria region of northern Italy. From the time the Italians invented pesto it has always been prepared with crushed garlic, basil, and European pine nuts blended with olive oil, Parmigianino Reggiano cheese, and sometimes including Fiore Sardo, a cheese made from sheep's milk.

The Italian word for pesto, pestare, means to pound, or to crush. Pesto was originally prepared with a marble mortar and wooden pestle. The ingredients were pounded or crushed with a circular motion of the pestle in the mortar. To most home cooks, pesto means the classic sauce made from basil, pine nuts, oil, garlic and Parmesan cheese. But some chefs, being adventurous types, have stretched the definition of pesto to include sauces and salsas using savory ingredients like cilantro, arugula and fennel.

Because the term pesto is a generic word for anything that is made by pounding or crushing, that leaves the original pesto sauce recipe open to flexible and differing ways of preparing the sauce.

Of course, pesto is a sauce for pasta, but it is also super as a sauce for meat, fish, chicken and even vegetables. Haddam Shad Museum Tour 212 Saybrook Road, Higganum, Ct. Sunday, May 22, 2022 \$5 Departing @10:30am.

From the mid 1700's through the turn of the 20th century, shad fishing was a thriving industry along the Connecticut River. Today, relics such as the Haddam Shad Museum exist to preserve history and regale visitors with the storied past of a beloved fish.

Though it's a little off the beaten path, this nugget of maritime history is worth the detour. In 1999, Joseph Zaientz—a former dentist and current shad enthusiast transformed what was once "Maynard's Shad Shack" into a museum of the same subject matter.

The Haddam Shad Museum refers to itself as "the only museum in the United States dedicated to the preservation of shad fishing history in the Connecticut River Valley." Inside, the American shad swims through the currents of United States history, including the legend of a miraculous surge at Valley Forge that fed George Washington's soldiers. (Though this story is well-known enough that it led to the shad's nickname of "the founding fish," there are no official records of shad reaching the area at the time.

Bill Maynard, who ran the now-defunct Maynard's Shad Shack, was a local fisherman in the 1930's and 1940's. His knives, used to debone the fish, as well as his old cash register, are proudly displayed at the museum. You'll even find a fish sculpture carved using the museum director's broken dental tools, made by one of his patients.

Though the industry's heyday has come to an end, each spring, shad journey from the Atlantic Ocean to spawn in New England's rivers. The "shad run" remains celebrated, and in Connecticut—where the American shad is the official state fish—the towns of Windsor, Essex, and Saybrook even host annual festivals. During this season (April to early July), and this season alone, the Haddam Shad Museum opens to the public.

CT-WiZ is Here to Help!

he Connecticut Department of Public Health Immunization Program has created a secure website called the CT WiZ Immunization Information System. This database maintains immunization records for those vaccinated in Connecticut.



Immunization Information System

Through this site, individuals can access their full immunization record and/or their COVID-19 vaccine record either as hard copy or in a digital format which can be stored on a phone or as a QR code, also known as a SMART Health Card. Those organizations or venues that utilize the SMART Health Card app, such as an airport, can scan the QR code and verify your COVID-19 vaccination record. As required by Connecticut law, all information on this site is confidential.

THIS FREE SERVICE BENEFITS:

- Parent(s)/child's legal guardian who require access to immunization records needed for childcare, school or camp and
- Individuals who need access to their immunization records for college, employment and travel or,
- Anyone who was vaccinated in CT and has lost their COVID-19 Vaccination card
- Healthcare providers who need access to their patient's immunization record even if the patient has moved away from Connecticut or their doctor retires.

Eric Sloane Museum & Kent Iron Furnace 31 Kent-Cornwall Road, Kent, Ct. Monday, June 13, 2022 \$10 10:30am. Departing @ 9:15am.

The Eric Sloane Museum is located north of Kent village, on the west side of Route 7. It is in the National Register of Historic Places and in the Connecticut State Archaeological Preserve. The grounds are separated from the road by the tracks of the Housatonic Railroad.

A man of great energy and many talents, Eric Sloane (1905-1985) was a prolific artist, author and illustrator of over 30-books and he was an avid collector of Americana.

His extensive collection of antique hand tools is displayed in a building run by the Connecticut Antique Machinery Association. It was gifted to the State in 1969 by Stanley Works, the Connecticut-based tool manufacturing company. The gift marked the company's 125th anniversary.

The collection in the Museum tells a fascinating story about bygone times and the great American heritage of craftsmanship. The Museum also has displays related to the industrial uses of the site in the 19th century.

Sloane's career as an artist comes vividly alive in his studio, minutely re-created with his paint-spattered easel and rows of jars jammed with paint brushes. Examples of his artworks are displayed in an adjoining gallery.

Adjacent to the museum, Sloane himself built a pioneer cabin as described by Noah Blake in Diary of An Early American Boy, an 1805 diary published by Sloane.

The Kent Iron Furnace is on the museum property. It is a stone structure 32-feet in height, with sides that are 29-feet at the base. The structure is built out of rough cut granite blocks randomly laid without mortar, with iron plates and tie rods added to prevent expansion-related problems.

The history of iron processing at this site began in 1826, with the construction of a cold blast furnace. Iron ore was brought to the site from a quarry in South Kent, and the processed iron was mainly used in the construction of railroads. That furnace was rebuilt as a hot blast furnace in 1846, and was enlarged to its present size in 1870. The facility was operated until 1892.

We will be meeting and leaving from the Senior Center at 9:15am. Our tour is scheduled for 10:30am. The guided, private tour highlights the museum art, tool galleries as well as a tour of the recreated artist studio and the 1805 recreated cabin and a brief overview of the Iron Furnace. It should last until about 12:30pm.

Old Drake Hill Flower Bridge-"Colors of the Rainbow" Old Bridge Road, Simsbury, Ct. and

Connecticut has quite a reputation for the natural beauty found at our beaches, forests, and parks. There are jaw-dropping waterfalls and spectacular sunsets to be discovered at many locations. But, tucked away in the northern part of our state, there is a stunning flower bridge that will take your breath away.

The Old Drake Hill Flower Bridge is located at 1 Old Bridge Road in Simsbury, Connecticut. It is an example of 19th century metal-truss bridge construction. Originally designed and built in 1892, it spans 183 feet and carries a 12-foot roadway suspended 18 feet over the beautiful Farmington River.

Constructed in 1892 as a one-way crossing for vehicles, it was replaced by a more modern two-lane bridge to the north in 1992. The bridge was kept as a pedestrian and bicycle crossing and prior to 1996, it was just a pretty cool historic bridge.

In the mid 90s, groups began to create community gardens on and around the bridge. The bridge became transformed into an enchanting pathway across the river. It currently has 62-flower boxes and 32-hanging baskets. For locals it has become a popular spot for graduation photos, proposals, and even small weddings.

Volunteers maintain this floral paradise each year. The bridge has been closed for the last two years because of renovations and then because of the pandemic. It is once more open once and it is better than ever!

We will be meeting and leaving from the Prospect Senior Center at 9:30am. Our first stop will be at The Shoppes at Farmington Valley in Canton, Ct. Once there you will be free to browse, shop and eat on your own at the many shops there. There are a number of eateries there to choose from.

BACK BY POPULAR DEMAND... The "Sick" Plant Clinic @ Prospect Senior Center Wednesday, March 30, 2022 10:30am. No Charge

This Sick Plant Clinic that we held back in July was such a success, we are bringing it back again for those who were not able to attend and wanted to.

Keeping ornamental plants in your home increases memory retention and concentration. The calming influence of plants is conducive to increasing a person's ability to concentrate on tasks at hand. Work performed under the natural influence of ornamental plants is normally of higher quality and completed with a much higher accuracy rate than work done in environments devoid of nature.

What good will it do you, however, if you are in the company of a sick plant or plants? What should you do if the leaves of your plant are turning yellow? Why are the leaves on the plant wilting? Why are the leaves falling off? Why are the leaves brittle and crinkled? Why is there mildew on the leaves?

Proper diagnosis of your plant is a critical step to bringing it back to good health. Before you can establish what control strategies should be taken, you must first determine the exact culprit that is making your plant sick. This can be difficult and confusing at times.

This is where our "Sick" Plant Clinic will be of help to you. This event will be hosted by Senior member, John Cookson. John has been in the landscaping, nursery and florist industry for many years.

The clinic will be held on Wednesday, March 30, 2022 at 10:30am. The program is aimed at helping you get answers and help for your "sick" plants and to answer any of your gardening questions.

If possible, you should bring your whole "sick" plant to the clinic for John to examine. He will offer you advice on what is making your plant sick and hopefully, how to make it better. He will recommend ways to treat your plant to help in preventing the problems you are experiencing with your plants.

John will also give a demonstration on repotting plants. If you have a plant that needs to be repotted correctly, bring it with you to the clinic. Also, bring along a new pot to repot it in. John will provide all the other materials needed to repot your plant and do the work for you.

New Britain Museum of American Art 56 Lexington Street, New Britain, Ct. Thursday, May 5, 2022 10:00am. Departing at 9:15am. Featuring: The Poetry of Nature: Hudson River School Landscapes from the New York Historical Society

On Thursday, May 5, 2022, we will be visiting the New Britain Museum of American Art (NBMAA). The Museum was founded in 1903. It is the first museum in the country dedicated to American art.

We have a guided tour scheduled for 10:00am. The tour will concentrate on the Museum's current exhibition, The Poetry of Nature: Hudson River School Landscapes from the New York Historical Society. The exhibit is a stunning array of over 40-paintings created between 1818 and 1886, The Poetry of Natureillustrates America's scenic splendor as seen through the eyes of over 25-leading Hudson River School artists. Artists including Thomas Cole, Asher B. Durand, John F. Kensett, Albert Bierstadt, as well as lesser-known, but important artists, Josephine Walters, Christopher Pearse Cranch, and Louisa Davis Minot, among others.

The exhibit at the NBMAA includes the addition of works by Robert S. Duncanson, the first Black artist of the Hudson River School to gain international acclaim. Drawn from the collection of the New York Historical Society, the exhibition explores the exchange of influence among this group of artists, their favored sketching grounds, and the legacy of Hudson River School painting today.

The Hudson River School rose to eminence in New York during the first half of the nineteenth century. The growing number of crowded industrial cities in the East gave rise to an appreciation for pictures of the landscape untouched by man. This closely-knit group of artists, together with like-minded poets and writers, forged a self-consciously "American" landscape vision and literary voice. Both were grounded in the exploration of the natural world as a rouse for spiritual renewal and as an expression of cultural and national identity. The Hudson River and the varied scenery along its banks provided the subjects for many of their landscape paintings.

We will be meeting and leaving from the Prospect Senior Center at 9:15am. Once at the Museum we will enjoy an hour long guided tour of the Hudson River School exhibit. After the guided tour we will give you an additional hour to visit the rest of the Museum on your own.

At 12noon we will board our mini bus for a lunch stop at Hometown Restaurant here in Prospect. **The cost of your meal is your responsibility.**

Dead Penguins - I never knew this!


